Furies were three goddesses who "punished the crimes of those who had escaped or defied public justice." Nemesis was the goddess of vengeance, representing "the righteous anger of the gods, particularly towards the proud and insolent" (pg. 34)

The Greeks feared angering the gods bc of the revenge the gods may take. Thus, revenge and pride are major themes in the myths.
